From the Constitution of Bethesda Lutheran Church, 2024

C13.05. When a vacancy occurs in a position for which this congregation calls a minister, a *Call Committee* of six (6) voting members shall be elected by the congregation council. Term of office will terminate upon installation of the newly called minister.

C13.05.01. Call Committee shall:

- a. Elect a chairperson who will be the primary contact with the Synod office, congregation council and the congregation.
- b. Represent a cross-section of the congregation (by age, gender, etc.)
- **c.** Seek to determine the needs of the congregation before the selection process begins.
- d. Interview perspective candidate(s) and make a recommendation of a pastor for congregation's consideration.
- e. The chair of the call committee shall notify prospective candidate of congregation's decision.
- f. Keep synod, congregation council, and congregation informed of progress.

Children exchange treats and humorous cards with classmates and friends; some bring home handmade cards for the adults in their lives. Romantic partners may go out to eat and present each other flowers, chocolate, a fancy card — maybe even an engagement ring! FEBRUARY 2025 - From LSI

February reminds us of love. Love for the Lord, love for our partners, and love for friends and family. We offer you this story of the power of love between a mother and daughter.

"Without Amy's support, I would still be an addict, and I wouldn't be where I am today," said Michelle, an LSI client.

Michelle was struggling with substance abuse, legal issues, and mental health issues when she found LSI therapist Amy Davis back in 2021.

"God helps us in ways we don't always want him to," said Michelle. "When the coronavirus pandemic hit, I lost my job. The unemployment lines were long at the time, so we went several months without a paycheck, so I decided to get creative with my finances. I started selling drugs and was later arrested with a large quantity of drugs. They came in, took my kid, and I went to jail. After that, I was referred to work with Amy at LSI."

Michelle and Amy worked through Michelle's childhood trauma, processing the significant losses in her life due to drug overdose and death. Amy helped Michelle work on building a positive support system, a list of future goals, and a relationship with her daughter. Rachel.

"Rachel and I had a lot of problems when we entered therapy because I was a drug addict, and there was a lot of broken trust between us," said Michelle. "LSI therapists helped us rebuild that trust and helped show her the progress I had made when she couldn't see it herself."

Rachel, in therapy as well, has been seeing LSI Therapist Chelsea Zaragoza since 2019. In addition to one-on-one therapy sessions with their respective therapists, Michelle and Rachel also do family therapy sessions with Amy and Chelsea. These sessions help the mother and daughter have time set aside to talk about issues they are having in a healthy, productive way.

"Michelle has had a lot of struggles, loss, and a lot of people who didn't believe in her, and her daughter was one of them," said Amy Davis, LSI Therapist. "We have worked hard doing family and individual therapy to bring those two back together, and it has worked. Where they are now, I don't think I've seen a mother-daughter relationship as healthy as the two of them are."

Today, Michelle has her daughter back in her home, she is thriving as a general manager at a coffee shop, and she is going to school for substance abuse counseling. She just received her one-year sobriety chip, and she has a good support system.

"To see how far Michelle has come since I met her is truly remarkable," said Amy. "She built the ladder, and she climbed out."

"I was a mess when I first came to LSI," said Michelle.
"Now, I'm sober, in college, have a high-paying job, and have my daughter back. Amy believed in me when no one else did, not even myself. She gave me hope."

These are some Lord's Cupboard usage statistics. (See the table below.) The numbers have held somewhat steady over the last three years. Except for the very end of 2024, usage increased. I think it may have been precipitated by the change in the vouchers given out. The Lord's Cupboard decided to make Jewell Market vouchers a specific dollar amount instead of a 'list of food' items they had to buy. This way they can get chocolate milk instead of white or different meats instead of hamburger and hot dogs. For the Lord's Cupboard it will make budgeting for the vouchers easier. With the 'list' of food vouchers people spent anywhere from \$30 to \$60 per month. But now they have \$45 (with a few limitations) to spend at Jewell Market.




THE LOVE CYCLE

From the Constitution and Bylaws of Bethesda Lutheran Church, these are responsibilities of the <u>Board of Youth</u>. As space allows, future Bethesda News will highlight other Boards.

C14.01.05. The **Board of Youth** shall consist of a minimum of three (3) voting members elected at an annual meeting for a term of two (2) years. No member shall be eligible for more than two (2) consecutive terms. The Board of Youth shall:

- a. Develop an effective teaching ministry which includes the training of teachers and leaders.
- b. Report its activities to the annual meeting of the congregation and at such other times as the congregation may decide.
- c. Plan and coordinate events and activities that will enhance the spiritual growth of the youth, grades 7-12, including securing youth advisors and determining curriculum.
- d. Be responsible for securing a youth director/youth minister/youth team member, should such a person be employed by Bethesda.
- e. Encourage youth to share their talents during worship services.
- f. Plan fundraising events for mission trips and other activities.
- g. Facilitate in finding parents and other adults to drive, chaperone, provide food, etc. for youth group activities.
- h. Communicate to parents and the congregation what is happening with the youth and their growth in Christ.

(minutes continued) New Business Nominating Committee

A few questions were raised about term limits for board members. Changes to the language in the Constitution regarding term limits were voted on at the 2024 Annual Meeting, and these changes will be ratified at the 2025 meeting. Board members who wish to extend their terms may place a request for an extension with the Church Council. Clarification on which board positions are open will be communicated to the Nominating Committee.

Annual Meeting Board reports are due on January 13. **Budget and Monetary Committee**

Dan Nibe presented the proposed budget of \$186,911.72 for 2025. The proposed budget includes the following the assumptions: donations are equal to the 3-year average, a new pastor will be in place by May 1, and there will be no wage increases for the staff in 2025. Budget trends over the past 6 years were also discussed. Revenues have been down approximately 4% per year since 2019 which is feeding into projected budget shortfalls that the Contingency Fund will no longer be able to cover. The committee asks the Council to put effort and prayers towards increasing membership and finding additional revenue streams. Jen Nibe moved to approve the budget of \$186,911.72 as presented; Hans Koehnk seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
