What is Christ the King Sunday? Beloved siblings in Christ of Bethesda,

Christ the King Sunday is an important day for Lutherans. It occurs on the last Sunday before Advent begins, which means it's the final Sunday of the church year. Because of the content discussed during bible and Brew in November, it seemed an appropriate opportunity to discuss this feast day. On this day, we remember and celebrate Jesus as the King who rules over everything, both earth and heaven. But this isn't about a king with a drown and throne like in stories. Instead, it's about Jesus as a loving and caring leader who brings peace and fairness to the world.

This special Sunday started in the early 1900s when Roman Catholic Pope Pius XI created it in 1925. He wanted to remind people that Jesus is the true ruler, even when the world seems full of other powers and leaders. Lutherans found this idea meaningful and also adapted it as the final Sunday of our Liturgical Calendar. The first Sunday of the Liturgical Calendar begins with Advent and follows the story of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection through seasons like Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost.

CELEBRATING CHRIST THE KING SUNDAY HELPS LUTHERANS REMEMBER THAT JESUS' KINGDOM IS DIFFERENT FROM ANY GOVERNMENT OR COUNTRY. IT GIVES HOPE THAT GOD'S LOVE AND JUSTICE WILL WIN IN THE END. THIS DAY ENCOURAGES US TO LIVE IN A WAY THAT SHOWS JESUS' KINDNESS TO ALL OF THE PEOPLE OF THE WORLD AND TO LOOK FORWARD TO THE TIME WHEN GOD'S PROMISES WILL BE MADE FULLY TRUE.

During worship on Christ the King Sunday, we hear Bible stories that talk about Jesus as King, often from the Book of Revelation and the Gospels. Songs and prayers focus on Jesus' victory over sin and death, his role as a caring shepherd, and the call for us to follow him with courage and humility. The call for us to follow Jesus is certainly the most challenging.

Another observance on this Sunday includes the practice of Holy Communion. This is observed by the overwhelming majority of Lutheran congregations. However, it extends also to the majority of Christian denominations that celebrate Holy Communion. Receiving the spiritual nourishment of Christ's Body and Blood empowers us to follow where Christ leads. As well as connects us with our King, Jesus Christ who is the Great Shepherd of the sheep, the Lamb who sits upon the Throne, the One who promises to make all things new.

For Lutherans, Christ the King Sunday is both a celebration and a reminder. It helps us see Jesus as the true King who rules with mercy, forgiveness, justice and grace. It inspires us to live with hope and purpose as we wait for the time when heaven and earth are joined forever and God's eternal kingdom comes into its full glory and light.




Celebrate the season of gratitude by creating a colorful Thankful decoration.

What you need:

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- · Pencil, marker, or crayons
- Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- Spray bottle filled with water
- Real leaves (Optional)
- Wooden or plastic beads, 0 0 cereal with holes (Cheerios, Froot Loops, etc.), or any dried pasta with a hole (Optional)

What you do:

- Draw or trace leaf shapes onto construction paper.
- Lay the paper flat and spray with water until the paper is completely wet.
- 3. Crumple the wet paper into balls.
- Open the paper and let the sheets dry flat.
- 5. When dry, cut out each leaf.
- On each leaf, write the name of one person or thing you're thankful for.
- 7. Punch a hole in each leaf.
- Lace the leaves, beads, cereal, and pasta onto the yarn, ribbon, or raffia.
- 9. Tie the ends and hang your garland.

NOVEMBER Adult Ed. Series:

The ELCA's "Use of the Means of Grace"

During the month of November, there are 5 Sundays. Interim Pastor Jonathan Dolan is inviting you to join a four-session (5-week) Adult Education series at the same time that Bible and Brew meets beginning on Nov. 2. Because there are 5 Sundays, that allows us an opportunity to spend a bit more time specifically in Parts 2 and 3 which are the sessions on Baptism and Holy Communion. This faith opportunity seeks to bring Word, Baptism, and Communion to life—rooted in the ELCA's governing document on those practices shaped for folks who value practical, faithful living in everyday work and community.

In each session we will read through the assigned parts together which means you DO NOT need to read anything beforehand, but you may choose to do so to familiarize yourself with the content for the session. By the end of month, you will be able to answer the question of why Lutherans are a Christian denomination that is rooted in the historic liturgy and sustained through the Sacraments to empower us for mission in the world.

Who would benefit from this class? This class is ideal for high schoolers recently Confirmed, lifelong Lutherans, folks who became Lutheran for their spouse, folks who have longed for a refresher of the central things of faith and everyone else in between.

<u>The first session</u> will cover the Preface and Part 1. The **Preface** grounds the series in a clear, life-giving claim: Jesus Christ is the living Word and the Spirit works through Word and Sacrament to create and sustain the Church to the glory of the Father. **Part 1: Proclamation of the Word and the Christian Assembly** will explore worship as the community's primary work of hearing Scripture, singing, confessing, and preaching. Practical, down-to-earth examples will show how the assembly gathers people to be shaped for service, care, and daily faithfulness—ideas you can take straight into family life, classrooms, clinics, and fields.

<u>The second session</u> will cover **Part 2: Holy Baptism and the Christian Assembly** which celebrates Baptism as God's once-for-all gift that marks us as God's own. We'll cover baptism for all ages, the role of sponsors and families, and simple ways to live out baptismal promises in routines, caregiving, teaching moments, and community life.

<u>The third session</u> Part 3: Holy Communion and the Christian Assembly invites us to re-discover the table where Christ meets us with forgiveness, grace and mercy in his very Body and Blood in the form of bread and wine. Topics include the unity formed at the table, why regular celebration matters, practical hospitality for those at home or in care, and how Communion shapes how we welcome and serve one another.

<u>The fourth session</u> Part 4: The Means of Grace and Christian Mission will tie Word and Sacrament to mission—how worship and sacraments equip the baptized to serve their neighbors, teach with compassion, and respond faithfully to daily challenges. Expect concrete, practical next steps for living sacramental faith in your daily routines and community commitments.

Finally, you might be saying to yourself, "Pastor why is this an entire page?" Because it is a 63-page document and he did his best summarizing it as briefly as he could. Pastor Jonathan hopes you will come on this faith journey. Further, he hopes so many folks will attend that we will need to move out of the Lounge and into Fellowship Hall!
